Non-U.S. Citizen Eligibility Requirements

Applicants who are not U.S. citizens must acquire or currently hold one of the following to begin training at UW Health in an ACGME accredited residency or fellowship program. Those who are unable to provide a UWH accepted work authorization may have their offer rescinded.

Work authorization types accepted

• Permanent Resident Card

A Permanent Resident Card, also known as a Green Card, authorizes the card holder the right to lawfully live and work in the United States permanently. More information on permanent resident cards can be found here <u>https://www.uscis.gov/green-card</u>).

• Employment Authorization Document

An Employment Authorization Card (EAD) provides temporary employment authorization to non-U.S. citizens in the United States. More information on applying for an EAD can be found here <u>https://www.uscis.gov/i-765</u>. Note: An EAD tied to an F-1 visa (F-1 OPT EAD) is *not* accepted for graduate medical education training at UW Health.

• J-1 visa status

The Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates (ECFMG) is authorized by the U.S. Department of State (DoS) to sponsor foreign national physicians as "Exchange Visitors" in the J-1 alien physician category. o Canadian Citizens and Landed Immigrants

Canadian citizens applying for J-1 or- J-2 visa status are not required to obtain a visa stamp at a U.S. Consulate to enter the United States. However, Canadian citizens must use Form DS-2019 to secure J status at a U.S. port of entry.

• Change of J-1 visa category

A change in category from J-1 research scholar to J-1 alien physician is possible under certain circumstances. It requires pre-approval from the U.S. Department of State and must be initiated by ECFMG. The requirements for a change of category request and other details are outlined on the ECFMG website <u>here</u>.

The U.S. immigration system is complex and the UW Health GME Office is not permitted to give legal advice regarding work authorization eligibility or changing one's nonimmigrant status. If you are currently in a nonimmigrant status not listed above, it is recommended you consult with an immigration attorney <u>before</u> making a commitment.

Work authorization types not accepted

H-1B visa

As an employer, UW Health does not sponsor H-1B visas for graduate medical education.

F-1 visa or F-1 OPT

An F-1 visa is a student visa and is not accepted for graduate medical education training. An EAD for Optional Practical Training (OPT) while in F-1 status is not accepted for graduate medical education at UW Health.
